Term Break - Safe Haven Program for 3 weeks in April



Happy times at Safe Haven School Break Program!

- 1. FOOD
- 2. Learning
- 3. Medical care



All the children were back on Rusinga Island, having lots of fun activities, except for Seth, whose only close relative passed during the break. The children have food every day, while so many local kids go hungry. They also have the security of "Safe Haven," especially if they are full or partial orphans or have serious illnesses. We love these precious children and will visit them later this year! After the Safe Haven program ends and school begins, the year round feeding program takes over for them again.

On Rusinga Island, Drought Continues for the 2nd Year

In April we normally have the heavy rains for the year, and this is the only time when rains last long enough for the maize to fully grow. In 2016, the maize crop failed. In 2017, these heavy rains have been sporadic, and most families on Rusinga lost their maize crop again. Their next chance for a good crop will be June, 2018. Many cows and donkeys had died before the rains came, since they usually scavenge for food.

How does this affect the people?

- 1. <u>With skyrocketing food prices during the drought</u>, hunger is a major part of their lives, especially the most vulnerable children, those who are orphaned and/or physically challenged, as are many of those we serve.
- 2. <u>HIV spreads more rapidly</u> for two reasons: (1) more men depend on Lake Victoria for fishing when farming is not productive, and (2) more women must go to the fishermen and trade sex for fish when they have no other food for their children. Job opportunities are extremely rare on Rusinga Island.
- 3. <u>Lake Victoria water</u>, <u>which is notoriously dirty</u>, <u>becomes even more polluted</u>, <u>increasing the cases of water borne diseases such as typhoid fever and malaria</u>, <u>of which our children are often victims</u>.

The good news:

Safe Haven is blessed with an 8000 liter water tank, provided in February by CanAssist Africa. Although rains were too sporadic for most crops, the tank was full after just a couple nights of heavy African rains. Rains come and go, and what a blessing to have clean water for the children at the year round Safe Haven programs.
